PUBLIC SESSION

- 1. Mr. Null indicated there was no addition or deletion to the Public Meeting Agenda. The Board of County Commissioners, on a motion by Commissioner Hinebaugh, which was seconded by Commissioner Tichnell, and made unanimous by Chairman Edwards, approved the Public Meeting Agenda for January 19, 2021.
- 2. The Board of County Commissioners, on a motion by Commissioner Tichnell, which was seconded by Commissioner Hinebaugh, and made unanimous by Chairman Edwards, approved the Public Meeting Minutes of December 22, 2020.
- 3. Proclamation: Human Trafficking Awareness Month January 2021
- 4. Update on County Response to COVID-19: Robert Stephens, Garrett County Health Officer provided an update on COVID-19 and vaccine .
 - Compliance in the community is better with people wearing mask and social distancing
 - Vaccine Distribution:
 - Garrett County is doing better than any other County in the State
 - Currently working on Group 1A. Anticipate beginning Group 1B next week (75+)
 - Vaccinations dependent on the number of doses we receive from the State.
 - Allocation has been 400 doses a week. At this rate it will take 3-4 weeks to vaccinate all eligible people in 1B.
 - Next group is 1C (65+ and educators) and should be available by the first of February. Dependent on the number of doses we receive on a weekly basis.
 - The Garrett County Health Department will publish a link on its website to register for an appointment, calls are also accepted. It is faster to register online. If you call, expect to wait, or get busy signals.
 - This is for Group 1B-age 75 and older. You must register. If you register and show up but are not over 75 you will be turned away. Everyone is required to show identification or proof of age.
 - We understand that people with underlying health issues under 75-year-old may make a reasonable case to be vaccinated, however, we are following state guidelines and are focused population groups.

- When pharmacies and other health care providers get access to the vaccine you can try to schedule appointments through them. They are better suited to prioritize patient needs.
- 5. **Child Adolescent Health Work Group Update** Dr. Karl Schwalm, Dr. Stephanie Sisler, and Mary Van Sickle, presented an update on the findings of the Child Adolescent Health Work Group. A copy of the presentation is attached.
- 6. The Garrett County Purchasing Department presented the following recommendation:

Bid Rejection - Bid # 20-1105 – Hoyes Run Water Treatment Plant Project

Three (3) bids were received – Beitzel Excavating , LLC (\$1,851,382.00), Excavating Associates, Inc. (\$2,047,554.00), and BYCO Enterprises, Inc. (\$2,056,814.19).

The recommendation is to reject all Bids due to the on-going Thayerville water project. Once the Thayerville project is completed, the County will reevaluate the Hoyes Run Project and seek additional funding for the project.

The Board of County Commissioners, on a motion by Commissioner Hinebaugh, which was seconded by Commissioner Tichnell, and made unanimous by Chairman Edwards, approved the Bid Rejection as recommended.

- 1. 2019 Survey of Middle and High School Students and Parents (40-50% of each of these four groups
 identified stress, anxiety and depression as their greatest health concerns)

 B. Violence: 7% of kids didn't go to school due to safety concerns in last year
 Bullying getting worse, is worse among females, worse electronically
 Physical and dating violence 8%
